It is also my duty to announce that the ILR membership fee is being raised from \$75 to \$80, beginning with the April 2004 term. Since the last fee increase was implemented (in 1998), revenues have remained stable, while expenses have continued to climb. In fact, the national cost-of-living adjustment over the past six years has totaled 13.4% while our \$5 increase works out to a more modest 6.7%.

Bradley University will continue to monitor our financial situation annually and effect smaller incremental increases as they become necessary... rather than delay these fee hikes temporarily and then be obliged to impose heftier, more painful ones in the future.

There are few better values around than the courses and the camaraderie found at our ILR, which truly is one of the best such programs in the nation. Please join us this Spring for what promises to be another outstanding session of intellectual inspiration and enrichment.

### Local - Commerce Unseen

#### *Dirksen Congressional Center - Tuesday, February 10*

Our visit to the new Dirksen Congressional Center in Pekin will include a tour of the new historical materials storage space which features documents, artifacts, and audiovisual materials from the collections of Everett M. Dirksen and Robert H. Michel. Frank Mackaman will present The Center's history and programs, show selections from the historical holdings and talk about the 2004 presidential election.

#### *Peoria County Emergency Services and Disaster Agency - Tuesday, February 24*

This facility is located near Kickapoo and is the Emergency Operations Center for Peoria County. It was built in the early '60s and is an underground facility. ESDA works with various departments and agencies in the planning for emergencies in Peoria County. The Peoria County ESDA Underwater Rescue Team is a part of ESDA, which also has a communications team and weather spotters. Vicky Turner will lead this tour, which will require climbing stairs.

*Rembrandt's Journey: Painter, Draftsman, Etcher:*

*Art Institute of Chicago*

*Wednesday, February 25*

Rembrandt van Rijn (1606–1669) is one of the most creative and celebrated artists in history. With more than 200 works from all periods of his long career—approximately 20 paintings, 30 drawings, and 150 prints drawn from major collections here and abroad—this is the first American exhibition to explore Rembrandt's astonishing range and variety of activity as a brilliant etcher seen in the context of his paintings and drawings. Rembrandt's Journey highlights the parallel relationships among the master's paintings, drawings, and prints—closely examining imagery, narrative content, and the marks of the artist's hand, as well as his approach to religious illustration in all of the media he mastered and reinvented.

*Trading and Exchanges in Chicago*

*Monday, March 22*

Join us for a lecture, tour, and discussion of the Chicago Stock Exchanges by an Exchange Director. He will:

- take the mystery out of the many nuances of the exchange.
- explain how the Chicago Exchanges have a direct effect on Wall Street.
- clarify why a movement at one exchange affects the prices at another exchange.

In addition, an exchange expert on electronic trading will present an explanation for the results at an exchange, from the first click of the mouse at your computer to the completion of the trade. Our day will start at the Chicago Board of Trade with an introduction to the workings of the US Futures Markets. We'll observe live market action in the grain complex and trading from the financial floor visitor's galleries. Our next stop is the Chicago Board Option Exchange where we'll learn about stock options trading from the trail of an investor. Then on to the Chicago Mercantile Exchange for an opportunity to view trading of S&P stock index futures, the most actively traded financial product of any kind in the U.S. We will also hear about OneChicago, the new equities exchange launched last November, which is having a stronger impact on Wall Street everyday. Our day will conclude with a historical review of the growth of the business, from agricultural futures to modern financial instruments.

Fermilab, originally named the National Accelerator Laboratory is committed to firm principles of scientific excellence, esthetic beauty, stewardship of the land, fiscal responsibility and equality of opportunity. Fermilab conducts basic research into particle physics - meaning that they keep asking basic questions. They investigate the smallest building blocks of matter separated by the smallest distances that science has ever explored. They are constantly trying to learn more about these fundamental particles, and understand the forces that hold them together or force them apart. We will have a guided tour of the lab, explanations of their activities, a charter coach tour of their scenic grounds, and lunch at the nearby and well-regarded Mill Race Inn.

Our first foray into Iowa takes us to one of its newest landmarks, the National Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium. Our docent led tour of the experience will be both entertaining and informative. Enjoy dynamic aquariums, historical exhibits and a stroll through the wetlands and boatyard. It is a truly interactive experience. We will learn the history of the aquarium and how The Dubuque County Historical Society over the past 25 years has successfully raised \$54 million to establish and expand its Mississippi River Museum into the National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium. The Museum & Aquarium is accredited by the American Association of Museums - a distinction held by only nine percent of American Museums - and was named an affiliate of the Smithsonian Institution in August 2002.

Embark on a journey of the city's historical and architectural landmarks through lectures, discussions, daily walking excursions and field trips. Examine Quebec's history with emphasis on French heritage and learn about modern nationalism. Visit the McCord Museum for an impressionistic look at the history and lifestyles of Montreal.

This program includes daily walking and use of public transportation. The quiet and clean subway system, architecturally attuned to the climate, provides easy access for exploring the city.

*Milwaukee, Wisconsin*  
*Two Milwaukee Museums and Ten Chimneys*  
*Tuesday, June 1 - Wednesday, June 2*

This trip is planned as a weekday get-away at a great time of year. We will begin at the Milwaukee Art Museum with a docent led tour of their exhibit, *American Fancy: Exuberance in the Arts, 1790-1840*. This groundbreaking exhibition defines a previously unexplored art historical style and identifies its relationship with important cultural developments in early 19th-century America. *American Fancy* features more than 200 of the most expressively ornamental and emotionally engaging domestic artifacts ever produced in this country - objects labeled in the period as "Fancy." After the tour there will be time to visit other parts of the museum. We will conclude our day at the museum by stepping outside to view *The Burke Brise Soleil* ("wings") close. The "wings" consist of 72 carbon stainless steel fins, 36 on each side of a long spine, connected by couplings. Together the wings weigh 100 tons and span 225 feet — the size of a Boeing 747.

We will then proceed to the Holiday Inn Milwaukee- City Centre located in the heart of downtown Milwaukee where we will spend the evening. Fitzgerald's Bar & Grill is located within the hotel and there are many other restaurants for dinner nearby.

The following morning we begin at the Milwaukee Public Museum where we will visit *The Quest for Immortality: Treasures of Ancient Egypt* exhibit, followed by the IMAX film *The Mysteries of Ancient Egypt*. We will view exquisite Egyptian art pieces thousands of years old which dramatically illustrate the afterlife journey of the pharaohs. The exhibition features the largest selections of Egyptian antiquities ever to travel outside of Egypt and provides a window into the oldest civilization in recorded history.

After lunch we will leave Milwaukee and travel to Ten Chimneys, home of two of the most famous actors in theater history, Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne. Ten Chimneys is a landmark unique among our national treasures. Almost all of its historic furnishings, hand-painted murals, enchantingly personal décor, and diverse collections are intact and unchanged since the Lunts first assembled them.

Cost: \$259 for double occupancy (\$309 for singles) includes lunch both days all entrance fees and tours, charter coach transportation, and hotel room.
